


Figure 5. Not Prominent: Pre-Notice Letter




Figure 9. Prominent: Pre-Notice Letter




Figure 13. Internet Push Regular Schedule: Pre-Notice Letter




Figure 17. Internet Push Modified Schedule: Pre-Notice Letter




Figure 21. Welcome Screen




Figure 22. Login Screen




Figure 23. Address Verification




Figure 24. Address Verification 2




Figure 25. Address Verification 3




Figure 26. Roster Check




Figure 27. Sex




Figure 32. Property Value




Figure 35. Ancestry/Ethnic Origin




Figure 36. Language at Home/What Language?
