## Types of user research

NSF conducts a range of user research tasks to inform the design and development of key features on NSF.gov. The types of research we conduct include:

- Ethnographic interviews These interviews help us understand users' contexts and broader goals.
- Top-tasks This activity helps us prioritize the most important and common user tasks.
- Card sort This activity, which involves arranging topics into categories, helps us understand helpful ways to group information on our website.
- *Tree tests* This activity helps us examine how easy it is to find items in the website's navigation menus and better understand user tasks.
- Usability tests This form of observational testing helps us uncover issues for new site features.

#### What to expect

When conducting a study, we will reach out by email to confirm your interest in participating and will ask about your availability. There is no obligation to participate, and you are always free to decline. If you are interested in proceeding, we will schedule a time to conduct a remote user research session.
