Dear Mr. Champley:

The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) strongly supports the continued collection of data on the Survey of international Air Travelers (SIAT) form. The data collected on these forms are crucial to key components of BEA's economic statistics.

BEA uses data collected on these forms to prepare estimates of international travel receipts and payments for which the SIAT is a critical data source, and for which there is no substitute. This survey provides data on expenditures of U.S. residents traveling abroad and foreign residents traveling in the United States as well as data on the purpose of trip and destinations visited. Items used by BEA are listed in Attachment A.

Estimates based on data from the SIAT are crucial components of BEA's monthly estimates of international trade in goods and services. The travel-related estimates are the 2nd largest of all the services categories, accounting for approximately 20 percent of total services in 2023. The travel-related estimates also are a critical component of BEA's quarterly estimates of the balance of payments accounts and of gross domestic product.

The SIAT is also a critical source of information for the travel and tourism satellite accounts. Specifically, it is our sole source of detailed information on how much overseas travelers spend on various types of tourism-related commodities (e.g., transportation, lodging, food, entertainment, gifts and souvenirs). In addition, the SIAT plays an important role in our personal consumption expenditures (PCE) statistics. We use these data to remove expenditures abroad by U.S. residents from estimates of PCE, allowing us to estimate more accurately how much U.S. residents spend domestically on tourism-related commodities. We also use information on destinations visited by non-U.S. residents in the United States to produce BEA's Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) by state statistics.

BEA appreciates the opportunity to comment on ways to enhance the quality and utility of the data collected on the survey. We have provided specific recommendations that we believe will improve the response rate and clarify instructions in Attachment B.

ATTACHMENT B BEA Suggestions for Updates to the SIAT

- In the main instructions for question 19, we suggest specifying that the following types of spending be included:
 - Spending made prior to or after the trip. We are concerned that the wording "what
 was the total spent outside your own country" could be misinterpreted as duringtrip spending, which would exclude pre- or post-trip spending.
 - O Spending made by an employer or another on behalf of the traveler. The traveler may not realize they should report spending made on their behalf because the question asks the respondent to report how much was spent "by you and your travel party." This could be exacerbated by the pre-/post-trip concern raised in the prior bullet because payment on behalf of the traveler is likely to be made prior to or after the trip.
- Update the wording of the expenditure question (19a)
 - Reiterate that U.S. residents should report what they expect to spend. In December 2017, when asked by BEA to examine the very large increase to the nonresponse rate and to average expenditures for U.S. residents that coincided with the survey redesign in 2012, Skip Hull of CIC Research speculated that the nonresponse could be due to the change in question wording for 19a, which asks respondents to report the amount that "was" spent, which may be confusing for travelers who are just embarking on their trip.
 - Specify that the reporter should exclude international airfare that is reported in
 19b.
- Expand the collection of spending by type (19e) to cover U.S. residents
- Slim down the expenditure by type question (19e) to remove the questions on currency and number of people included in spending (ask respondents to use the same currency as 19d).
- Explore administering an online follow-up survey to U.S. residents who indicate they would be willing to participate when they return from their trip.

Below we offer suggested language as an example for how our suggested changes could be achieved.



19. These next questions ask about the amount of money spent, or expected to be spent, by you and your travel party (travelers for whom you have financial responsibility). Please estimate how much total money has been spent, or will be spent, outside your own country by you, your travel party, or on your behalf. Please include spending made prior to your trip, such as spending on prepaid accommodations, or that will be made after your trip, such as spending on a rental car that is billed after your trip. If you had a prepaid package, do not include those items you listed in 18d above.
