People have a right to energy access, and electric-utilities are public serving entities, most of which are allowed to operate as monopolies. The power of utilities to disconnect citizens from energy represents a very grave power that should be used responsibly. All too often utilities do not do their due diligence in helping their own customers access programs that could assist them such as LIHEAP and Weatherization Assistance. Utility disconnection creates a crisis in the lives of the families affected, and only a minor inconvenience to the entities performing the disconnection. For purposes of equity, justice, and transparency, it is critical that advocates and consumer protection organizations have access to utility shutoff data in some granular geographic way to address the disproportionate impact utility shutoffs have in particular communities.

I am writing to make my public comments known on the issue of data transparency and collection through form EIA-12. As an elder activist of Third Act! I am deeply concerned about the energy inequalities and problems in our country.

The development of an expanded data base of utility shut-offs will increase the data transparency that can help enshrine access to utilities as a basic human right. Data transparency will help us make good energy decisions.

The data from form EIA-112 can achieve far more than the EIA's stated goal of aiding decisions regarding budgetary support for the Low-Income Heating Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). By delivering much-needed data transparency on the scale and nature of our country's utility shutoff crisis, the survey can also bolster the efforts of utility justice advocates and public officials who fight for more transformative and longer-lasting solutions to energy poverty—like utility shutoff bans, income-based debt relief and management programs, increased funding for the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP), equitable rate restructuring, and the equitable deployment of distributed energy resources (DERs).

Although shutoff data exists, persistent data gaps at the national level continue to mask the true magnitude of utility injustices.

The findings only capture a portion of nationwide utility shutoff totals because **44% (22) of** states fail to require utilities to disclose their residential electric and gas shutoffs for non-

payment. Even among the 29 states that do require disclosures, as of 2023, only 13 mandated clear, standardized, and monthly data.

Given the enormous scale of national energy unaffordability, the survey should include more data on customer debt to clarify the harmful impact of predatory credit and collection policies at the state and utility levels.

In a climate-changed world, access to life-saving electricity is a human right! Share this data from utility companies nationwide for consistent standards and access.

Access to utilities like electricity is a human right. Yet these life-saving services remain unaffordable and inaccessible for countless families across the country. This was especially pertinent during the COVID-19 pandemic, when an economic downturn combined with a lockdown meant families had to make sacrifices over putting food on the table or paying a utility bill. Even after the pandemic, this crisis persists as profit-driven utilities prioritize their bottom line over ensuring access to a public good.

No one should have to forego basic needs to keep the lights on.

EIA Employees,

I write to you today, as a retired **medical epidemiologist** who worked as a federal employee at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta for 32 years.

One of the fundamental principles of disease surveillance is that it works best when it is conducted in a standardized manner in every state in the USA. For chronic diseases, this allowed us to compare states and to draw inferences from those which are doing relatively well, that helped improve chronic disease prevention and treatment in those which were doing relatively poorly. In infectious diseases, comprehensive surveillance is critical for for early detection, warnings, and responses, and to better inform prevention and control measures.

I live in Georgia, one of about 15 states that was judged to have "Up-to-Date Reporting" of electric utility "shut-offs" (disconections) in household residences. Reporting in another dozen states was judged to be "Irregular or Delayed". Electric and gas providers in the remaining 23 states apparently have no data to share with your agency. As you know well, different states have different policies regarding "shut-offs" - some states prohibit in summer and winter months, where it can result

in severe illness or death from hypothermia or hyperthermia. Others have only one, or neither of those policies. As our climate changes, understanding the effect of utility shut-offs on morbidity and mortality in all parts of the US and during all months of the year would help shape effective public health measures to ensure that unecessary hospital admissions are prevented, and that lives are not lost prematurely.

I strongly support the Residential Utility Disconnections Survey (EIA-112) of electric and natural gas regarding final termination notices, service disconnections, and reconnections for bill non-payment across residential customers. All citizens deserve to be treated fairly by the electric utilities, in particular those who live in service areas where there is no option to choose a different provider.

I sincerely hope that you will be able to implement this survey as quickly as possible, and that it will provide strong enough evidence to repeat it annually so that utilities no longer have a free hand to do harm to their customers without reporting it to the state and federal authorities charged with making sure that the utilities operate safely, reliably, and in the best interests of the customers they serve and the state and country in which they operate.
