Third-Party Reporting Promotes Accurate Business Income Reporting. In many cases, the tax law requires third-party payers, such as small businesses or individuals, to report to the IRS payments they have made to subcontractors, attorneys, architects and other service providers. There are various forms used to enable and verify third party reporting information. One example would be Form 1099-INT which is used to report interest income. I am attaching an older IRS Fact Sheet relating to third party reporting reminders. This may provide some additional guidance relating to this topic.

Our comment notice dated August 26, 2024, is requesting public feedback on the burden associated with complying the various tax laws that address this reporting. I hope this helps.
