

# LOW DOSE, INTERMITTENT ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION IN ADHESIVE ARACHNOIDITIS (AA)

AA is a serious, debilitating, life-shortening disease. Treatment requires these three components:

- 1. Suppression of inflammation and autoimmunity
- 2. Restoration of damaged tissue
- 3. Control of pain

To institute an effective treatment plan, multiple medications including nutritional supplements are necessary.

## Necessity of Intermittent, Low Dosage Therapy:

Only a relatively small number of medicinals have been identified that are consistently effective in treating AA. It is essential that some of these critical medications be used at a low dose and on an intermittent basis to avoid side effects and to keep the medication effective.

### **Definition of Intermittent:**

- 1. 1 to 4 days a week
- 2. Days are skipped so dosage is not taken daily

### Critical Medications for Low Dose, Intermittent Use:

Methylprednisolone/dexamethasone Ketorolac Nandrolone Human chorionic gonadotropin (HCG) Peptides (BPC-157, KPV, Thymosin-Beta, ARC-290)

### ADD-ON MEDICATION THAT CAN BE USED INTERMITTENTLY (2 to 4 days a week)

Pentoxifylline Metformin Doxycycline Acetazolamide
