I strongly oppose the proposed changes to the DS-11 form, which are discriminatory, unnecessary, and harmful. By replacing the term "gender" with "sex" and requiring applicants to list their biological sex at birth, these revisions disregard the identities of transgender and nonbinary individuals. At a time when many nations are recognizing gender identity in official documentation, these revisions place the U.S. out of step with global human rights progress. Instead of implementing policies that isolate and endanger individuals, the government should focus on ensuring accessibility, fairness, and respect for all passport applicants.

I urge the Department to reject these changes and maintain a passport system that reflects and affirms the identities of all Americans. These revisions are not about security or practicality—they are about exclusion, and they should not be implemented.
