Depending on your exact definition, there are between 0.02% to 1.7% of the population that are born intersex. That is to say, according to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, "do not fit typical binary notions of male or female bodies."

If their chromosomes do not match their body, how can they fill out a form that requires them to match their sex at birth if that does not reflect their post-puberty sexual characteristics?

If a person is born with ambiguous genitalia, how do they fill out this form? Based on what someone wrote on their birth certificate? Or the sex that were correctly identified as later?
