-This discriminates against not only trans persons, but also intersex persons, whose body may physiologically not fit the M/F sex binary from birth, and may either not have been assigned a sex marker, or assigned one based off of abstraction.

-Making gender markers align with assigned sex rather than a person's gender can be confusing for TSA and customs agents who are going to get sex markers on passports that don't remotely match the appearance of the person who is standing in front of them or their photo. It makes all participants involved, and discriminatorally violates the right of trans persons to privacy from agents who may be prejudiced against them, and possibly raise the risk of violence or harrassment for persons of trans identity in these situations, such as in the past, like in police stops.

-Having gender or sex markers on passports is unnecessary, as passports already have a photo of the person which is more accurate for identification purposes. You don't need their gender and CERTAINLY not their sex at birth to confirm it's the right person.
