Every citizen deserves a U.S. passport that matches who they are to ensure they can safely travel, obtain employment, interact with law enforcement, and go about their daily lives without fear of harassment, undue scrutiny, and discrimination. It is in this way that the current administration's executive order on passports serves as an undue infringement on intersex and transgender Americans' due process rights as determined by the 4th, 5th, and 14th amendments and upheld by the supreme court in Griswold v. Connecticut (1965) and Bostock v. Clayton County (2020).
