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## **Comments Received:**

I am writing to voice my opposition to the proposed changes to the Application for a U.S. Passport: Name Change, Data Correction, and Limited Passport Book Replacement, as outlined in the executive order titled "Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government."
