#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

<u>Background.</u>--This proceeding was instituted in response to a petition filed on April 24, 2025, by Globe Specialty Metals, Inc., Beverly, Ohio. Countervailing/antidumping duties may be assessed on the subject imports as a result of these proceedings if the Commission makes an affirmative determination of injury, threat, or material retardation, and if the U.S. Department of Commerce ("Commerce") makes an affirmative determination of subsidization/dumping. U.S. producers of silicon metal have provided the USITC with allegations about sales or revenue that they have lost due to competition from imports of silicon metal from Angola, Australia, Laos, Norway, and Thailand. One or more domestic producer(s) have named your firm in such an allegation.

<u>Silicon metal</u> covered by this proceeding is all forms and sizes of silicon metal, including silicon metal powder. Silicon metal contains at least 85.00 percent but less than 99.99 percent silicon, and less than 4.00 percent iron, by actual weight. Semiconductor grade silicon (merchandise containing at least 99.99 percent silicon by actual weight and classifiable under Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) subheading 2804.61.0000) is excluded from the scope of this investigation.

Silicon metal is currently classifiable under subheadings 2804.69.1000 and 2804.69.5000 of the HTSUS. While the HTSUS numbers are provided for convenience and customs purposes, the written description of the scope remains dispositive.
