RING 3

Image: Man scrolling through social media. (BETWEEN RINGS) Image: Car wreck.

VO: We're sorry, the person you are trying to reach is not available at this time. BEEP.

The following images cycle over the VO.

Image: LEO doing a traffic stop. Image: LEO issuing a ticket.

Image: Car wreck—the worst one in the spot.


Cut to black.

SUPER: This is your wake-up call.

Fast cuts take us through different bad driving behaviors.

A woman types on her phone and has to brake hard.

A man looks up from his phone with a shocked face and has to swerve.

We see the exterior-facing camera from another car that has to navigate around a distracted driver.

We see a LEO giving a distracted driver a ticket.

The music escalates.

The exterior facing dashcam view shows a crash as it happens.

We linger on a dash cam knocked to the side.

Her mom picks up on the other end.

MOM: Caroline, are you driving? I'm hanging up. You'll get a ticket.

DAUGHTER: Wait, this will only take two seconds—

The daughter crashes with another car in the intersection.

The phone flies out of her hand but survives the crash. The camera stays locked on the phone and ongoing video call.

MOM: Caroline? CAROLINE! Are you okay?

We don't hear anything from the daughter.

MOM: Talk to me, please. Are you okay?


We cut to see law enforcement officers and EMS arriving on scene.



Protagonist: What?

Finally, we **CUT** to see the protagonist in his car driving. From their POV, we see them looking at their phones. The protagonist looks up right at the moment before he plows into another car. We go to black.
