USCIS	Comment Submitted by Anonymous	<p>I do not support the proposed collection. The USCIS and other enforcement organizations have been able to sift through threats and determine eligibility in the past without the proposed information. The proposed collection does nothing other than micromanage an individual's life. Much of this information may also be lost, such as previous emails or phone numbers.</p> <p>This would also pose a higher burden on USCIS workers, which would increase the backlog of cases, particularly in the Forms I-589 and I-751, whose processing times have only grown as time goes on. The burden placed on the Applicants and on the USCIS outweighs the benefits of intaking this information.</p> <p>This is an overreach of the government, and the USCIS should trust that the majority of the Applicants are applying in good faith. Otherwise, if we keep imposing new regulations and collections on Applicants, the trust in the USCIS will decrease not only by Applicants, but by the US constituents that have fewer to no ties to the USCIS, leaving people deciding not to take action and leave themselves in a vulnerable and with no other paths to getting status. This is contradictory to the very insistence of the current administration, who wants people to do things "the legal way". They should not be punished with having so much extra burden for trying to cooperate with the government and ensuring they are following a legal pathway.</p>
