Perez "No one should have to sacrifice their life for their livelihood, because a nation built on the dignity of work must provide safe working conditions for its people." The only thing OSHA's paperwork collections system protects is the dive company and those contracting the job.

In Plain English: OSHA's method of gathering information is not adequate! Five days before you even have to report a death assures that any interviews and investigation, will be weeks if not months after the event. OSHA's system of classifying a lost diver is under whatever trade he is working for; Dockworker, Fisherman, Plant Operator etc., this obscures the true statistics and makes it difficult to get any lessons learned from a

report when they are filled. If they can regulate Commercial Diving they can have a classification of Commercial Diver, they have none. The attached is fine example of an OSHA Accident report from their current paper work system. The hot links on the attached PDF are active. Attempts were made to rescue Employee #1 by another diver. Employee #1 was retrieved from the retention pond by the fire department rescue diver and air lifted to the hospital. Employee #1 drowned.
