The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) strongly supports the revised and continued collection of data by the National Agriculture Statistics Service's (NASS) Agricultural Resource Management Survey (ARMS). The data collected in this survey are crucial to key components of BEA's economic statistics.

BEA uses information collected in the ARMS' to prepare the national income and product, input-output, and the regional economic accounts. The list of data items used is attached.

In addition, we use many of the items indirectly through their use by the Economic Research Service (ERS) to prepare the national and state estimates of farm income — the principal basis for BEA's estimates of farm income and product. Though farm income and product are small shares of national income and product, their volatility must be accurately measured to identify the sources of change in the overall economy. BEA does not use the Chemical Use Surveys that are part of this NASS filing.

Please keep BEA informed about any modifications to this form. We are particularly interested in any modifications proposed during the form's approval process that would substantially affect our use of these data.
