





























































































































































































- ⇒ The Wisconsin salon industry is an important component of the economy, generating \$746 million in annual sales and providing employment opportunities for more than 10,700 individuals.
- ⇒ The coronavirus pandemic had a significant impact on the Wisconsin salon industry.
- ⇒ Between 2019 and 2021, the number of salon industry jobs in Wisconsin fell 12%. In comparison, total private sector employment in the state declined 3% during the same period.
- ⇒ In addition to providing jobs in a challenging economic environment, the Wisconsin salon industry also gives individuals of all backgrounds the ability to start their own business.
- ⇒ Sixty-six percent of Wisconsin salon businesses are owned by women, compared to only 18% of businesses in the state's overall private sector.
- ⇒ Thirteen percent of businesses in the Wisconsin salon industry are owned by minorities, versus just 6% of total private sector businesses.




