Dear Ms. Zeich:

The House Committee on Oversight and Accountability is conducting oversight over the AbilityOne Commission's (Commission) rulemaking to modify regulations implementing the Javits-Wagner-O'Day Act (JWOD Act). The Commission's mission is to provide blind and severely disabled Americans with employment opportunities to deliver essential products and services to Federal agencies. The Commission's activities support jobs for more than 36,000 people who are blind or have significant disabilities supplying almost \$4 billion in products and services to federal civilian and defense agencies every year. The Committee seeks additional information regarding the Commission's recent rulemaking activities, including how it is considering feedback from stakeholders and potential impacts on how Americans who are blind or severely disabled will continue to participate and benefit from the AbilityOne Program.

On March 13, 2023, the Commission published a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) entitled "Supporting Competition in the AbilityOne Program" seeking to revise regulations implementing the AbilityOne Program.<sup>4</sup> The Commission engaged in the rulemaking to amend the Commission's regulations with respect to pricing methodologies used to establish fair market prices for items on the Procurement List and the procedures for allocating orders among approved nonprofit agencies.<sup>5</sup> The JWOD Act mandates commodities or services on the Commission's Procurement List to be procured by federal agencies from a nonprofit agency employing persons who are blind or have other severe disabilities.<sup>6</sup> The JWOD Act also authorizes the Commission to "determine the fair market price of products and services contained on the procurement list that are offered for sale to the Federal Government by a

qualified nonprofit agency for the blind or a qualified nonprofit agency for other severely disabled."7

Nearly 100 stakeholders and members of the public filed comments to the NPRM.8 Commenters raised serious concerns with the NPRM, including that the Commission's underlying analysis related to estimated costs of preparing competitive bids is flawed, and that the proposed revisions would undermine the Commission's mission.<sup>9</sup> The Committee is interested in understanding how the proposed revisions to existing regulations contained in the NPRM will impact the JWOD mandate and the Commission's mission. Given the Commission's critical role in providing real economic opportunities to people who are blind or severely disabled, we seek to ensure that the Commission's rulemaking is consistent with law and will further its mission.

To assist the Committee in understanding how the Commission is receiving and addressing comments received in response to the NPRM, we request the following information no later than January 17, 2024:

- 1. A comprehensive description of the process by which the Commission is reviewing and responding to stakeholder comments raising concerns about the March 13, 2023 NPRM;
- 2. An estimated timeline for the Commission's rulemaking initiated by the March 13, 2023 NPRM, including any anticipated date for publication of the Final Rule; and
- 3. An explanation of all anticipated impacts of the proposed regulatory changes on the Commission's ability to achieve its mission to deliver products and services to federal agencies supplied by a workforce of Americans who are blind or have significant disabilities.
